SESSION 1 BREAKOUT

INFANTS AND TODDLERS TASH TREVETON

We begin the day with a workshop, during this session we will term "The five 5 R's" of infant practice:

Relationships - Routines & Rhythms - Rights - Responsiveness - Respect

We will unpack theories and approaches that can inform our practice & engage in reflection & discussion as a group.

SCHOOL TRANSITIONS NICOLE HALTON

What if we rethink the term "school readiness" and instead begin to think more about positive transitions to school?

In this workshop we will discuss how educators can identify the development of school readiness skills in the existing program and environment, share these with families and have authentic and meaningful discussions and experiences around the transition to school.

SESSION 2 BREAKOUT

CRITICAL REFLECTION TASH TREVETON

It is crucial, as professionals, that we are able to critically reflect, not only on our programs, but our practices, pedagogy and environments.

This session will focus on the key elements of critical reflection and reflective practice, including:

- Research and the National Quality Framework
- Methods of engaging in reflective practice and evidencing our reflections
- Overcoming challenges such as time and differences in educator philosophies
- Unpack the Exceeding Themes for critical reflection

PRACTICE NICOLE HALTON

At the heart of sustainability lies connection. While worm farms, recycling and vegetable gardens are positive steps, they are but a small aspect of raising awareness of sustainability with young children.

Throughout this workshop, participants are encouraged to consider the role of a connection to nature in embedded sustainable practice.

While looking at practical ways for services to be more sustainable, we will share the importance of the early years for developing lifelong capacity as global citizens.

SESSION 3 BREAKOUT

SENSORY PROCESSING TASH TREVETON

What is sensory processing and why does it matter? As humans, we are sensory beings. We explore the world through our senses, through the movement of our bodies. Have you ever watched a toddler spinning around and around in circles? Or a six year old who rolls down the hill again and again? Understanding and making sense of the role of the senses in children's play is vital to creating opportunities and environments where children's natural instincts are nurtured and they develop physically, emotionally and cognitively. In this workshop, we will explore the what and why of sensory processing and come away with practical ideas that you can use in your service.

EXCURSIONS NICOLE HALTON

Exploring the local community offers valuable opportunities to children, yet can sometimes feel overwhelming or challenging for services and educators.

This workshop will arm educators with the confidence to get out of their service and into the wider community, as they gain a thorough understanding of the regulations and requirements for excursions, as well as practical strategies (including the use of Benefit Risk Assessments and our Excursions Made Easy Toolkit).

We will discuss opportunities within your local community and consider the value of creating community connections.

SESSION 4 BREAKOUT

OUTDOOR PLAY TASH TREVETON

Have you ever watched a child running, rolling, digging and climbing? Perhaps you feel challenged to explain how this free, exploratory play in outdoor environments support children's learning and development?

This session will tap into all of those feelings, as we explore the importance of childhood memory development, as well as the importance of outdoor play. Through group discussions and practical stories and examples, attendees will unpack the challenges of outdoor play, the value of long periods of time outdoors and the practicalities for engaging with children in outdoor environments in meaningful ways.

ENVIRONMENTS NICOLE HALTON

The environment that we provide for children sets the scene for their play. While it can be easy to be drawn into beautiful images of well-designed play spaces, it is important to understand how and more importantly WHY we create the environment in the way that we do.

The workshop explores how we can create environments that are engaging and responsive to the way in which children play, interact and explore the world.

A highly regarded writer, Nicole writes regularly on the Inspired EC website, as well as guest writing for other publications, and has had several books published by Teaching Solutions.


Nicole is an advocate for children's rights and has a particular interest in positive school transitions, nature play and supporting nominated supervisors in their role.
